This allows parishes to record their energy usage – gas, electricity and oil – so that it can be used to calculate the diocese's carbon footprint. Online Faculty System upgrade 1st April 2025

Focus on the Energy Footprint Tool

The Energy Footprint Tool (EFT) is open for 2025!

What can it do for your Church?

The EFT is easy to use and shouldn't take you long to fill in. It enables you to:

- Better understand your Church's energy use trends.
- Helps scope potential heating solutions and kickstart various other carbon reducing projects.
- Apply to Net Zero grants and other relevant sources of funding.

How do I complete the EFT?

- The EFT is part of the online Parish Returns service.
- You will need to have your Church's (and other buildings such as Church Halls) energy use figures readily available.
- These figures include the building's electricity use (usually in KWh) and heating use (generally either KWh of gas or litres of oil).

To save time, complete your EFT as you prepare for your Annual Parochial Church Meeting (ACPM) and Parish Finance Returns.

This work is an essential part of caring for God's creation, by helping to combat global warming and climate change.



What's new for 2025?

- New questions have been added to discern all the buildings, not just the Church, in your parish and help you provide their energy use figures.
- You don't need to enter work-related travel expenses this year.
- The EFT is closing earlier this year 30th June 2025 - to give more time to analyse the data and share the results back in time for diocesan synods in the autumn.

Some Key Dates for 2025

As you are planning the diary for this year, remember to work with your Local Mission Partnership, so that you don't all try and host Strawberry Teas or Harvest Suppers on the same date. Some events you could collaborate for include:

Is your Quinquennial Inspection due this year?

Thank you to the parishes who are up to date with their Quinquennial Inspection report and who have sent us an electronic copy.

If your QI inspection is due this year, book your architect early, as they tend to work with several other churches too.



Recommended Monthly Tasks (From <u>SPAB's Faith in</u> <u>Maintenance calendar</u>)

January

- Have the electrical systems checked by a qualified person at least once every five years.
- Smoke alarms should be regularly tested and cleaned. Remember to replace the batteries too!
- Clear parapet and valley gutters of snow.

February

- Clear parapet and valley gutters of snow (see above).
- Make sure that the tower, roofs and windows are bird-proof before nesting starts. Do not disturb bats.
- Check the condition of any ladders in the tower and ask the tower captain to ensure that the bells and bellframe are in good order.

March

- Check that eaves, gutters and downpipes have not been damaged by frost. Look for cracks and leaks in rainwater goods.
- Clear parapet and valley gutters of snow to prevent melt water rising above them and causing damp internally. Take care in icy conditions.



Risk Calendar

January - Water pipes and heating

An escape of water can cause extensive and lasting damage. Check that your water pipes are lagged, the stopcock is clearly labelled, and your heating system has been serviced by a registered engineer.

February - Security

From theft to arson and vandalism, security is key. As every place of worship and its location is unique, a tailored assessment and response, reflecting the individual risks faced, should be undertaken.

March - Ladders

If using ladders or stepladders check that they are right for the job, free from defects and used properly, being appropriately positioned and secured.

Grant News

The Listed Places of Worship Grant Scheme (VAT Reclaim) -No news yet...

The Listed Places of Worship Grant Scheme (LPWGS) is due to expire at the end of March 2025. After the Budget, the DCMS advised that they were entering a period of business planning which will determine what happens with the LPWGS. They expect this process to take a number of months. In the meantime parishes are advised to continue to plan projects as if the LPWGS will continue, but include in your risk register details on how you would fill any shortfall if the scheme was discontinued. This could include local fundraising, applying for other grants or requesting a grant uplift from funders already committed to your project.



National Lottery Heritage Fund

In their last round of funding, the National Lottery Heritage Fund granted £1.25m to places of worship across the UK. Read more about the projects here.

Minor Repair and Improvement Grant and Quick Wins Grant

A variety of applications for the above grant schemes went to the Grant Panel in early December. For the Minor Repair and Improvement Grant, these included the usual small but vital repairs to roofs, rainwater goods and repointing, including the rebedding of some coping stones to stop water damaging the ceiling, the improvement of ventilation to stop damp and rot becoming a problem and the upgrading of drainage to increase the capacity and simplify the route taken.

The Quick Wins cases included the replumbing of a heating system to connect it to the church hall system rather than the church system, allowing the areas to be zoned. Grants were also given for replacing lightbulbs with LED bulbs, a contribution towards electric seat cushion heaters and insulating a suitable roof void.

Both grants have to be spent by the end of December 2025. The application deadlines for this year are 1st March, 1st June and 1st September. If you would like an application pack for either grant or would like to talk through a possible application, please contact Fran or Matthew.


